11a) We know you lead a busy life, full of activities, many of which are required of you. Tell us about something you do simply for the pleasure of it.

The world can be hectic, and time can fly pasteurize. But I like to sit back sometimes, fermenting interesting ideas in my head. I'd be joined by friends who'd come and go: juice, poultry, younger milk cartons. I remember my good friend "Dill" Claussen; he had a bit of a sour personality but always had a snappy fresh outlook. Then there was Cherry Smuckers: sweet, but always in a jam. Sadly I haven't stayed in touch since we parted ways, but during our time in the dark when the humans left us alone, we'd talk about each other's problems; I don't think the humans ever noticed. I guess you could call it our group meditation.

11b) Although you may not yet know what you want to major in, which department or program at MIT appeals to you and why?

During our lives, we must jump over many curdles. I had an early interest in biology, before all life in me died. Now I've discovered that my interests lie closer to organic chemistry. Given my prior interest in the culinary arts, the interdisciplinary MIT Laboratory for Chocolate Science would be the perfect blend of culinary and orgo chem that I'm looking for. Understandably, I wouldn't be able to participate "hands-on" without talking to the Committee on the Use of Humans as Experimental Subjects first, but everything one step at a time.

12a) What attribute of your personality are you most proud of, and how has it impacted your life so far? This could be your creativity, effective leadership, sense of humor, integrity, or anything else you'd like to tell us about.

I've found myself the center of attention many times. For example, my friends say that I exude an air of maturity that can dominate a room. Some might say that my independence has made me spoiled, but they don't really know me. I've had to work hard on my passions to get where I am today; that is why I'm mature, not spoiled.

I've also been told many times that I'm charismatic, perhaps even an infectious personality. This led me to becoming an assistant tour guide at my adopted home, Random Hall — a summer job which has helped me achieve personal growth and flourish, and to help others in need. I've charismatically won the MIT Ugliest Manifestation on Campus contest five times: the most times any person has won. In doing so, I've raised hundreds of dollars for local Boston food banks.

Self-direction has been important to me in facing down criticism. After my abandonment, I spent years pursuing my twin passions: applied organic chemistry, and immersing myself in different cultures. If I had taken the path laid out for me, I would be in a garbage dump. But instead, I chose to embrace my past and make the most of it. Without self-direction, I would not have found myself here, applying to MIT.

Literally, my world is a refrigerator. But my family and community are what have shaped me into what I am today.

I come from a very diverse culture. Some of my ancestors had a tradition of producing their own alcohol. Others have traditions of wild orgies of reproduction, and yet others have a tradition of gorging themselves and producing large quantities of gas. But whether I've had it rough or easy, at the end of it all, I realize I am a mere byproduct — a byproduct of this clash of cultures. So at multicultural MIT, I feel I would have a rich background of my own to contribute to the community.

Additionally, I've learned a great deal from my friends, so I'll probably be able to learn a great deal at MIT through osmosis.

12c) Tell us about the most significant challenge you've faced or something important that didn't go according to plan. How did you manage the situation?

I was separated from my mother at an early age. As far as modern medicine could determine, I had approximately two weeks to live, perhaps slightly more with preservative care. This condition is all too common among cartons of milk like me.

In light of this, I yearned to become part of something greater. I watched from my shelf at Shaw's market as my siblings were adopted by eager shoppers and went on to become successful cakes, omelettes, fritters, or simply achieved happiness in domestic partnerships with cereal. A few lucky ones even became crème brûlée. I thought I was on a similar path.

Initially, things seemed bright! A young human took me into his home; I had such plans! However, his excessive workaholicism led to neglect, and I was left alone in the dark and cold for days at a time. By the time others intervened months later, the experience had changed me forever. Left on my own, I had to mature and enculturate myself without guidance from others. The result left a sour taste in my mouth.

I was past my prime, and the path of culinary excellence I had expected to pursue was closed off forever. But having survived well beyond my two week prognosis, I felt I'd gained a new lease on life. I became friends with many humans who celebrated me for who I had become! They supported my interests in organic chemistry and cultural development. After years of independent work in these fields, I feel an academic career at MIT is the next step on my new path.

"Grade A Milk is milk produced under sufficiently sanitary conditions to qualify for fluid (beverage) consumption. It is also referred to as fluid grade milk. Only Grade A milk is regulated under federal milk marketing orders. Grade B milk (also referred to as manufacturing grade milk) does not meet fluid grade standards and can only be used in cheese, butter and nonfat dry milk. More than 90% of all milk produced nationally is Grade A. Therefore, much of the Grade A milk supply is used in manufactured dairy products. Minimum standards and requirements for Grade A milk production and processing are outlined in the Grade A Pasturized Milk Ordinance (PMO) published by the Food and Drug Administration." (Womach, 2005)

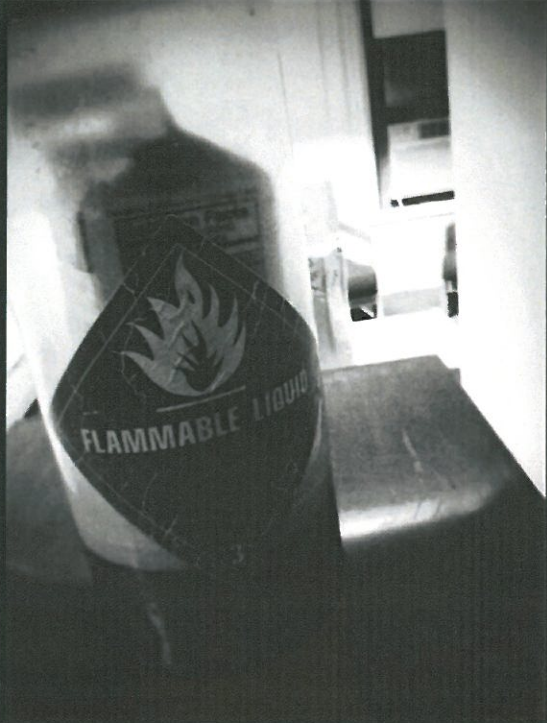

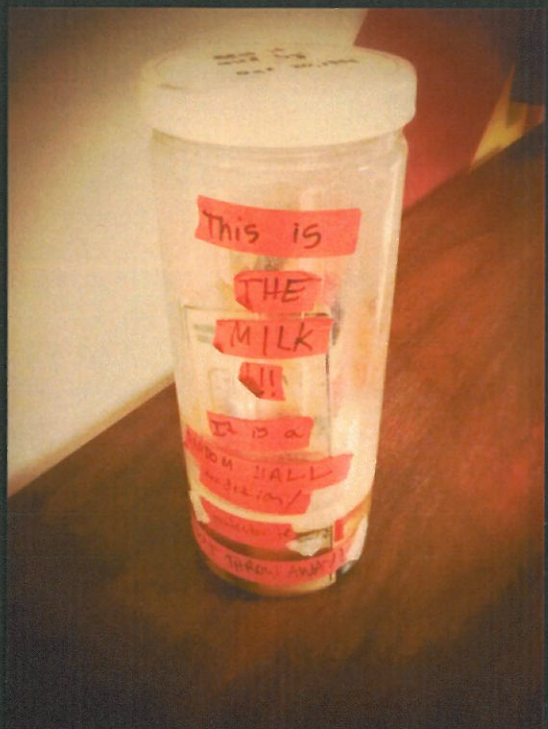

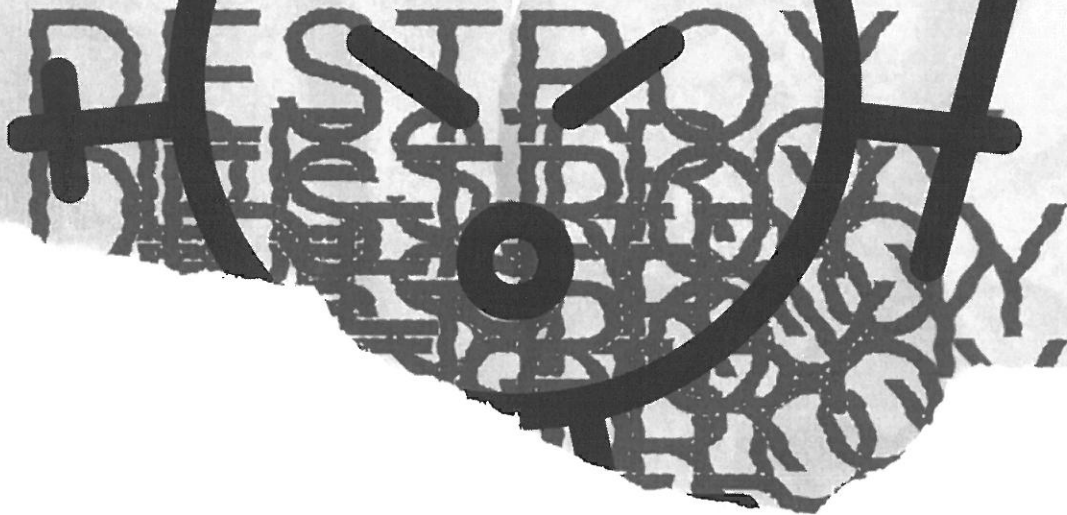

Please find below my interview of Themilk Milk from Cambridge, MA. We were both pressed for time, though I do think I can provide good insights on why Milk might be a good fit in the MIT environment. —Ben Bitdiddle '79

Milk suddenly appeared before me. Being people of few words, I waived complicated introductions and Milk acquiesced.

I started us off by telling Milk a bit about what MIT is generally like, things to watch out for, things to remember, differences he might not expect, etc. I do worry that I dominated the conversation, but Milk has a very respectful (and interestingly stoic) demeanor, letting me finish my thoughts before thinking about commenting, surprisingly mature.

I then left Milk to its own devices while I grabbed another cup of coffee. Our interviewee worked out several complex chemical reactions in the interim.

During this time, Milk attracted much attention from passers-by, and was in the middle of an interesting conversation when I returned. Milk has a strange duality: social yet reserved.

Milk was also very presentable, with better hygiene than many undergrads.

Year-Old Sour Milk is Ugliest Manifestation on Campus

Milk. It does a body good. For Justin O. Cave '98, this year's Ugliest Manifestation On Campus, sour milk was the beverage of choice as his campaign as the Institute's vilest carton of milk raised over \$300 for charity.

Cave and his sour milk campaign defeated runner-up Steven E. Jens '97 by the narrowest margin in recent years, 47 cents.

Between Cave, Jens, and other competitors, UMOC — an annual charity fund-raiser sponsored by the national service fraternity Alpha Phi Omega — raised \$913.64, up from \$765.60 last year.

"I think it went pretty well," said UMOC Publicity Chair Jeffrey S. Poore '97.

"We were happy, but at the time,

Random Hall had just started to blow up, and for a while, we didn't think we had won," said Cave, a Random Hall resident, referring to the Sunday night fire at his dormitory [see story, page 1].

Jens, who wore a smoking jacket and argued for ugly people's rights, was disappointed with his loss. "I was kind of upset about not getting it. I just wanted the title."

Contest gets ugly for charity

UMOC, which ran through last Friday, is a charity fund-raising "ugliness" contest sponsored entirely by APO, Poore said. Any student who is not a member of APO could run for the UMOC title.

Contestants set up collection jars in Lobby 10; each penny students contributed counted as one vote.

The money usually goes to the

winner's favorite charity. However, because the spread between first and second place was so small, APO will meet today to decide whether to donate all the money to Cave's charity, the Boston Food Bank, or to divide the money between Cave's choice and Jens' choice, the American Cancer Society, Poore said.

Cave raised \$308.52 and Jens received \$308.05. Third-place Sharon J. Hollander '97 raised \$126.95, followed by Jay P. Muchnij '97 at \$84.04, Omri Schwarz '97 at \$46.58, Sonia Chawla '98 at \$19.38, and Nathaniel J. Bower '98 with \$4.73.

Originally titled the Ugliest Man On Campus, the contest was given its current name to allow women compete, Poore said.

Write-in votes totaled \$17.74. Proceeds from the event will go to the charity of the winner's choice.

This year's contest "didn't start out so strongly," said Emily M. Marcus '01, the candidate coordinator for the contest. Several of the

candidates didn't choose to run until mid-week, slowing the results.

Marcus said this year's contest, with many issues being presented by candidates, is "a little bit unusual." However, many of the perennial candidates, including Steven E. Jens '97 and Jay P. Muchnij '97, have graduated.

Only Bisen-Hersh and Dwyer are running as themselves. The other six candidates were all running with objects or issues as their themes.

The UMOC contest began in 1952. Its original name, Ugliest Man on Campus, was recently modified to allow a wider variety of entries to the contest.

This year, APO will be adding \$500 to the total contribution pot. "It's not something we usually do, but we thought it might be something to do," Marcus said, noting that the added cash might motivate individuals interested in their charity to vote more.

Only some actively campaign

Some of the candidates are actively campaigning for the UMOC title, while others have chosen to play the low road.

"I'm just along for the ride," said Dietrich. A group of individuals are "publicizing inside and outside the [Interfraternity Council] and dorms."

"We want to make this a political statement," Dietrich said, noting this week's release of the Undergraduate Association's poll on housing issues. "We really want to back that up."

Dietrich said he hoped that the UMOC would "publicize the issue [of housing] and get it out in the open."

If Dietrich wins, the proceeds will be donated to CASA, a Cambridge group that provides court advocates to youth.

Milk runs again for second time

A perennial candidate in UMOC, Random Hall's five year-old milk makes a return appearance this year.

"When ... you start wondering whether the item of food might not contain the life form that will take over earth in the future, I think that's pretty ugly," Zbarsky said.

The milk will make an appearance in Lobby 10 tomorrow to campaign for Zbarsky.

In 1995, the milk helped Justin O. Cave '98 win UMOC by just 52 cents.

Zbarsky said that he was mainly campaigning for the prize using freshmen from Random Hall, his dormitory.

The soured, disintegrating milk should again be declared UMOC, Zbarsky said, noting that "I'd certainly consider it worse than Kerberos V."

If Zbarsky wins, the proceeds will be donated to the Dana Farber

Cancer Institute.

Bisen-Hersh campaigns in drag

Bisen-Hersh, one of the candidates campaigning as himself, decided to participate since A "really wanted someone to run" an individual.

"Because it didn't take any of time, I said okay," Bisen-Hersh said.

Although he has not campaigned much, Bisen-Hersh said he could win "if I really wanted to buy pressure people." At this point, his goal is to "beat the UA."

Bisen-Hersh considers himself to be the UMOC "only when I'm in drag," adding that he may make a Lobby 10 appearance tomorrow.

Other candidates less active

Stiaszny said that while he is running for UMOC with "Transparent Horizons," a sculpture located near East Campus, he is not that involved with the actual campaign. "I'm a little too hosed/aesthetic to care about UMOC."

Stiaszny added that East Campus residents in general feel that the sculpture is ugly, since it looks like the refuse from a scrap metal press.

East Campus President Kai-Hsiao '99 said that while the dormitory was not officially campaigning for the sculpture, "I think East Campus has traditionally and historically opposed the existence of that thing."

If Stiaszny wins, proceeds will go towards gun control efforts.

Kretchmar said people should vote for Kerberos V, the most authentic software used in Athens, because the million-plus lines of code are "so bad, Microsoft rewrote it."

This year's contest ends at 8 p.m. today; winners will receive the "Ugliest Trophy on Campus" in the near future, which will be displayed in the student center.

Simmons, Aramark Vie for UMOC

If you've never experienced the foul stench of a six-year-old carton of milk rotting away in a dorm fridge, visit Random Hall today. Then decide whether mandatory dining or Simmons Hall could possibly be any uglier than Random Hall Milk.

MIT's chapter of the Alpha Phi Omega service fraternity is running the annual Ugliest Manifestation on Campus contest once again. Today

is the last day to vote in Lobby 10 by donating money to charity in the name of a favorite UMOC candidate.

Boston Officials Win 'Ugliest' Competition

The results of the Ugliest Manifestation on Campus charity fundraiser were announced to an intimate crowd of approximately ten in Lobby 10 yesterday. The overall winner was the "People Shutting Down Skuffle," amassing \$333.54.

The contest raised a total of \$1222.43, which will be given to the Skuffle charity, the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society.

"One of you here today is unspeakably ugly," said Michael J. Salib '03, Alpha Phi Omega's UMOc project chair, to the crowd of mostly UMOc contestant representatives. He then announced the top five contestants and their earnings.

"This year's first place prize is a framed certificate authorizing Mr. [Jake C. Pinato '04] and his brothers at PKS to hold a Halloween party anywhere they want, without penalty from Alpha Phi Omega," Salib said in an e-mail to the umoc-interested mailing list.

"We're delighted that we collected so much money for charity," Salib said after the award ceremony. The amount of money that was raised this year was more than has been raised in each of at least the last three contests. Salib said that last year the contest earned approximately \$500.

Frat party beats out Simmons

Skuffle, the annual Phi Kappa Sigma Halloween charity event, was cancelled this year after the City of Boston turned down requests for work permits. Pinato, a member of the fraternity, entered Skuffle Shut-down in the UMOc contest. Pinato was not available for comment.

UMOC organizers said the top contestants received much of their votes on the final day of the contest, last Friday. The crowd was visibly surprised at the results of the contest because the perennial favorite, Random Hall Milk, finished fourth, and this year's early frontrunner, Simmons Hall, finished second.

"One of these days a dorm will beat a frat," said Ross E. Benson '03. He said that on the final day of the contest, he set up a collection jar at the front desk of Simmons for residents to cast their vote for the

dormitory. Benson then took the money to the official collection jar in Lobby 10. He said that Simmons might have fared better in the contest if the collection jar had been at the front desk of Simmons for the duration of the contest.

Simmons calls for milk to retire

"I think the milk will return victorious," said David A. Lepzelter '04, the milk's representative at the ceremony. However, "I think Simmons is pretty ugly," he said.

Benson thinks that it is time for the milk to retire. "I don't think it's ugly. Smelly, yes," he said.

The Random Hall Milk turned eight years old this year. Lepzelter said the milk was left in a Random Hall refrigerator by a lactose-intolerant resident after a botched attempt to make macaroni and cheese.

Some think Simmons is beautiful

Mark F. Rios '05, who does not live in Simmons Hall, entered the People Who Think Simmons Is Ugly as a contestant in UMOc. He felt that these people lack "architectural taste."

"I think I was robbed," Rios said about the contest. "I bequeath to [people who think Simmons is ugly] strip malls and Harvard dormitories."

He says that next year he will probably enter either Objectivism or John Ashcroft in the UMOc competition. He hopes that one of his nominees will win UMOc before he leaves MIT.

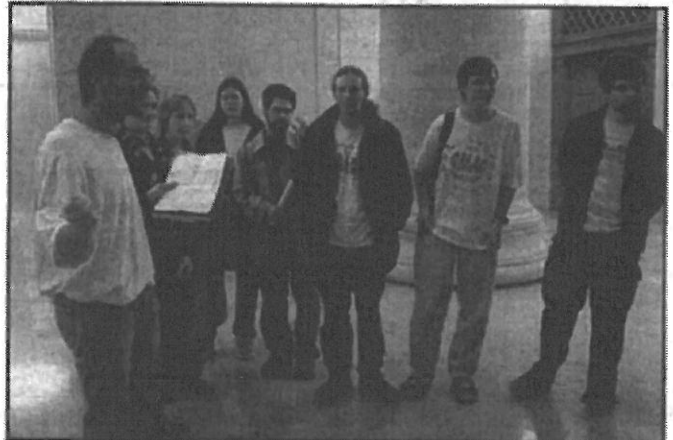
UMOC is an annual tradition

The UMOc fundraiser began at MIT in 1953 as the Ugliest Man on Campus. It is not unique to MIT; chapters of APO at other universities hold the competition each year. In 1992, the name of the competition was changed to Ugliest Manifestation on Campus to encourage women and people representing non-human entities to enter the contest.

Each year, jars for the candidates are set up in Lobby 10 and members of the MIT community can cast votes. One cent equals one vote.

Past contestants have included Aramark and the Undergraduate Association.

Resources, an organization that helps bridge language and cultural barriers for members of the Asian community, according to their Web site.

Contestant Brandon S. Moore '09 ran to protect the honor of Random Hall, whose resident carton of rancid milk won the competition in 1995, 1998, 2000, 2001, and 2003.

Moore chose his charity, the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation, after his mother's battle with the disease.

Joshua L. Pevner '08, a self-proclaimed narcissist and terrible person, is running for Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, because "it's the only charity [he has] ever heard of."

"All the people in Random Hall are not attractive, but some-

APO has been running UMOC since in the early 1950s. While some chapters have abandoned the contest, MIT has kept the tradition. UMOC was known as the Ugliest Man on Campus until 1992 when a female ran on the idea that "being a woman made a very ugly man," Pepper said.

"For a couple of years the name was experimentally changed into Ultimate Manifestation of KOR3, and now it is the first time that the name is changing back to Ugliest huMan on Campus and coming back to its roots," Pepper added.

The polls have closed for this year's UMOC competition, and the winner will be crowned at an award ceremony today at 5:30 p.m. in 4-270.

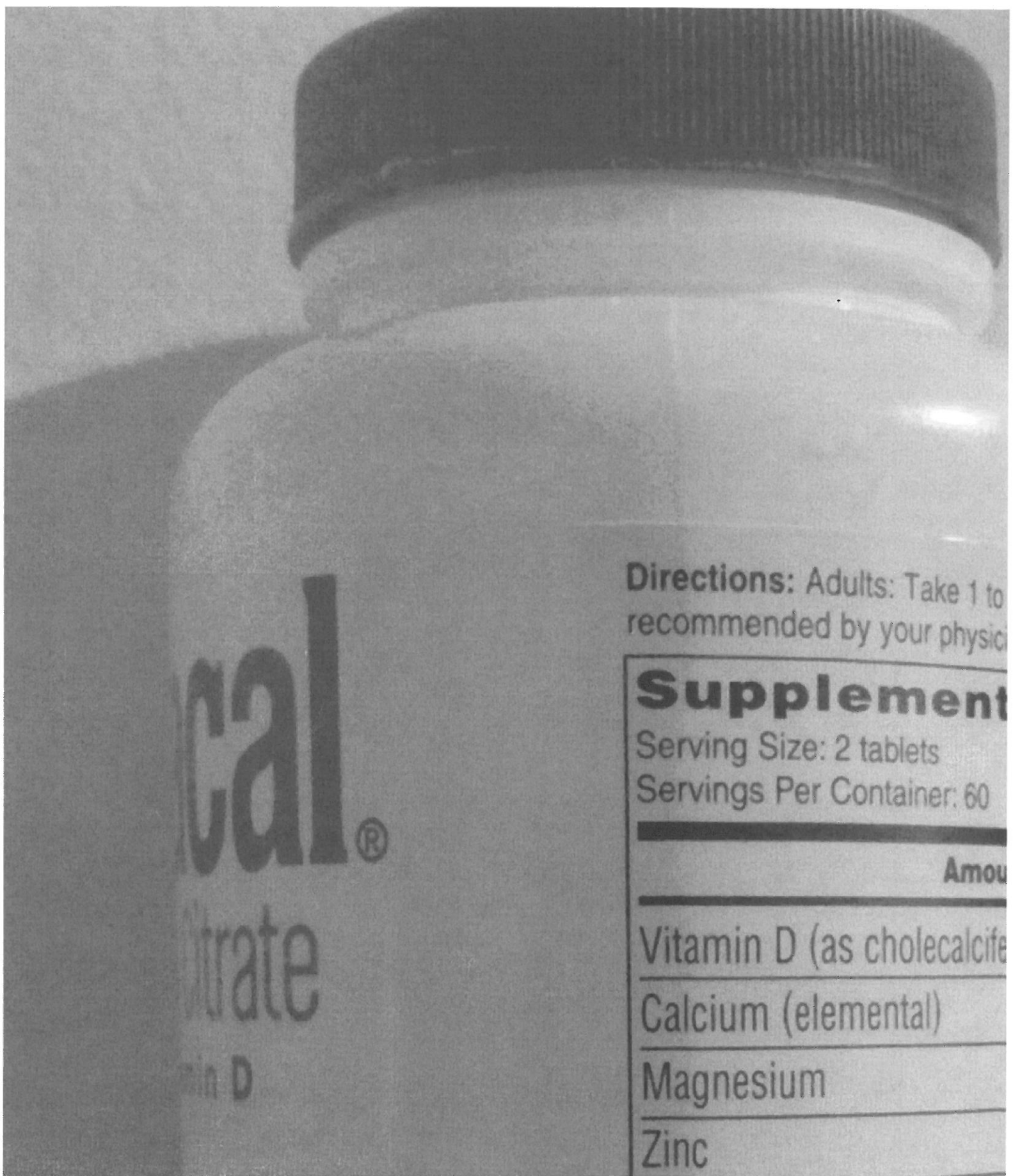
